## Zolli Candy Webquest Answer Key



**Teacher Notes:** Have your students visit the <u>Zolli Candy website</u>. They should explore the website to find the answers to the webquest questions.

### 1. How are Zollipops different from regular lollipops?

Unlike regular lollipops, Zollipops are actually good for your teeth. They are vegan, all-natural, and sugarfree.

### 2. How did Zollipops get their name?

Zollipops got their name when Alina's younger sister, Lola, mispronounced the name of one of the teeth-friendly ingredients.

### 3. What is the Million Smiles Initiative?

It's Alina's mission to save kids' smiles, since tooth decay is America's single most chronic childhood disease.

### 4. What other products has Alina developed in addition to Zollipops?

She has created Zolli Drops, Zolli Taffy, Zolli Caramelz, and Zolli Gummeez.

# Becoming an Entrepreneur Answer Key



**Teacher Notes:** Show the students the video <u>PBS Biz Kids</u> <u>Interviews: Creator of Zollipops, Alina Morse</u>. Have them answer the questions as they watch it. Use the sample answers to discuss entrepreneurship.

### Where did Alina get the idea for Zollipops?

She got the idea when she was at the doctor's office and she was offered a lollipop. Her dad always told her that she shouldn't eat candy because sugar is terrible for your teeth. She wanted to make candy that is actually good for your teeth.

### What steps did Alina take to create Zollipops?

- **1.** She did research and wrote down her ideas. She researched online and talked to her dentist. She made a list of flavors and colors.
- 2. She saved money and borrowed some from her dad to buy the ingredients she needed to start making Zollipops.

### What advice does Alina give other kids?

She says to start saving money, even if it's only a little bit. It will accumulate, and eventually you'll have enough to start your own business.

### What do you think an entrepreneur is?

An entrepreneur is a person who starts their own business.
