Copyright

An author's published words and an illustrator's published illustrations cannot be used by anyone else without permission.

The words and illustrations are protected by law by what is called the copyright.

The date the book is published is called the copyright date.

The symbol for copyright is a small c within a circle followed by the date.

Copyright © 1989

The copyright symbol, followed by the copyright date, is located in the front of the book, usually on the back of the title page.

The Dedication Page

An author and/or illustrator may wish to publicly thank a person or persons who helped in some way with the book, or as a sign of affection or respect.

To do this, the author and/or illustrator dedicates the book to the person or persons.

This dedication, found on what is often called the dedication page, is located on a page in the front of the book.




Books about Famous People

All biography books are grouped together on the shelves in your library. They are arranged alphabetically according to the last name of the person written about, not the author.


The Card Catalog

Show students where they can locate the fiction books, an area that may be divided into such different areas as Easy Reading (E), Picture Books (X), and Fiction for Older Boys and Girls (F). Then take your students on a tour of the nonfiction section of the library. Show spines of several books and point out that the nonfiction books have numbers to help identify where they belong on the shelf.

SAMPLING NONFICTION

Objective: Students will be introduced to the ten main classes of nonfiction; will read a book from each of the ten main classes.

DEDICATION PAGES

Objective: Students will identify the dedication page of a book.

Directions: Locate the Easy Reading and/or Fiction section in your library and choose some of the students' favorite books to look at and examine. Find the dedication page at the front of the book. Explain that some books do not have one.

A BUNCH OF BOOKS

Objective: Students will understand the alphabetical arrangement of easy and/or fiction books; will locate books on the shelf using the author letter.

COPYRIGHT

Objective: Students will be introduced to a book's copyright and copyright date.

THE DEDICATION PAGE

Objective: Students will understand the meaning of the dedication page and will be able to locate the dedication page in a book.

MY FAVORITE AUTHOR

Objective: Students will learn about some favorite authors and their works.

BOOKS ABOUT FAMOUS PEOPLE

Objective: Students will locate information about a person.

BIOGRAPHIES

Objective: Students will understand the nonfiction genre of biography and will locate a biography book.

Answer Key: 1. B; 2. K; 3. C; 4. A.

LOOKING FOR BOOKS

Objective: Students will identify a book's publisher, the place of publication, and the copyright date.

LET'S CHECK OUT OUR LIBRARY

Objective: Students will explore their neighborhood library. Answers may vary.

Objective: Students learn how to use a dictionary. Answers may vary.

MAKING A BIBLIOGRAPHY FOR A BOOK

Objective: Students will become familiar with the format used when writing a bibliography for books.

MAKING A BIBLIOGRAPHY FOR AN ENCYCLOPEDIA

Objective: Students will become familiar with the format used when writing a bibliography for encyclopedias.

MAKING A BIBLIOGRAPHY FOR A MAGAZINE

Objective: Students will become familiar with the format used when writing a bibliography for magazines.

GOOD READING!

Objective: Students will practice using the card catalog; will become familiar with Caldecott Medal books

NONFICTION BOOKS IN THE 300'S AND 700'S

Objective: Students will become more aware of the call numbers and subject of books found in each section of the Dewey Decimal System.



FUN IN THE NONFICTION SECTION

Objective: Students will locate books in the nonfiction section.

Directions: To avoid congestion, have part of the children begin looking in the 599 section, some in the 398.2 section, some in the 520 section, and some in the 636.8 section. Remind students that they are to fill in all of the titles and authors, however.

NONFICTION BOOKS IN THE 200's & 800's

Objective: Students will become familiar with the call numbers and subject of books found in each section of the Dewey Decimal System.

NONFICTION BOOKS IN THE 500's & 900's *Objective*: Students will become familiar with the call numbers and subject of books found in each section of the Dewey Decimal System.

CHOOSING PERIODICALS

Objective: Students will become more aware of the different periodicals and the types of information found in them.

CARE OF BOOKS

Objective: Students will understand the proper care and handling of books.

Directions: The activity sheet can be used as a basis for discussing the proper care and handling of books. You might have the students color the pictures.

GUIDE WORDS

Objective: Students practice finding words in the encyclopedia and dictionary.

Answer Key: 1. dust, duplex, dunce, dusk. 2. dwell, dye. 3. mirror, Morse, code, Mississippi, moose, moonbeam.

THE CARD CATALOG

Objective: Students will know all books and most other materials have at least one card. Answer Key: OWLS M-0; PLANTS P-R; RABBITS P-R; SUN S-T; BEARS A-B; HORSES H-J; CDE; MNO; HIJ; UVWXYZ.

FREAKY'S FUN

Objective: Students will know that all books and most other materials have at least one card in the card catalog.

Directions: Be sure to show how your card catalog is set up for books. For example, the author card is arranged alphabetically by author's last name; the title card has the book's title on the top line in alphabetical order (omitting the A, An or The if they are the first words in the title); and the subject card has the book's subject first. You may want to point out the letters on the front of each drawer and discuss what they represent.

LISING THE DICTIONARY

Objective: Students will use a dictionary to find information.

Answer Key: 1. 10; 2. B; 3. answers will vary; 4. time to go to bed; 5. bed.

LIBRARY FUN

Objective: Students will alphabetize; will become familiar with the library.

Directions: Take the students to the sections of the library where filmstrips, records, picture files, and computers may be found. Then have a brief talk on how important alphabetizing is in the library. Let

the children color the bear and the balloons after they have finished the worksheet.

Answer Key: 1. books; 2. computers; 3. filmstrips; 4. pictures; 5. records.

FIND THE CALL NUMBER

Objective: Students will shelve and locate books on the shelves.

Directions: Give the worksheet to the students after you have explained that the "E" of the call number stands for Easy section and the bottom two letters are the first two letters of the author's last name. (If you do not use the "E" designation, white out the "E" on the call numbers and fill in the designation you use.) Have the students color the appropriate balloons first and then find the call numbers on the shelves and locate a title of a book by each author. Answer Key: E/Br—red; E/Ke—green; E/St—blue; E/Al—yellow; E/Se—orange.
