Sample Sequence Structure Organizer



1	Wildfires or human activities destroy vegetation on slopes.


A landslide is a type of natural disaster that can cause a lot of damage. It starts when wildfires or human activities destroy vegetation on slopes. The roots of the vegetation hold the soil in place. When the plants are removed, the slope is weakened, and the land is more likely to slide away. Then, something disturbs the natural stability of the slope. For example, there could be heavy rains, earthquakes, or volcanic eruptions. Next, masses of rock, earth, or debris move down the slope. Finally, everything in the landslide's path is covered or destroyed. Landslides are dangerous natural disasters.

Sample Cause and Effect Paragraph



There are many negative effects of a landslide. During a landslide, water moves rapidly and rocks and other debris fall down a slope. As a result, many people are often injured, and many buildings are destroyed. Electrical, water, gas, and sewer lines are often broken because of the falling debris. Railways and roadways are covered by the water and dirt, so it's hard for people to travel and get medical care. Landslides cause a lot of destruction.





Sample Problem and Solution Organizer



Problem:

A(n) *landslide* is approaching your house, and you need to stay safe.

Solution #1	If you have time, evacuate by leaving the area where the landslide is occurring.
Solution #2	Move quickly away from the path of the landslide. If rocks and debris are approaching, run to the nearest shelter and take cover.
Solution #3	If you're driving, stay alert. Roads may become blocked or closed because of the landslide.





Sample Problem and Solution Paragraph



If a landslide is approaching your house, there are several ways you can escape this problem and stay safe. One solution is to evacuate by leaving the area where the landslide is happening. If it's too late to evacuate, move as quickly as you can out of the path of the landslide. If rocks and debris are approaching you, run to the nearest shelter and take cover. If you have a car nearby, you can drive to try to escape the landslide. Just make sure you stay alert because roads might be blocked or closed. By choosing one of these solutions, you have a good chance of staying safe during a landslide.


